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The Older Americans Act (OAA)

- The Older Americans Act (OAA) is the major federal vehicle for delivery of social and nutritional services for older adults.
- The OAA also supports grants to older American Indians, as well as research, training and demonstration activities.
- Most OAA programs are administered by the Administration for Community Living (ACL) est. in 2018 by U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

The Older Californians Act (OCA)

- Signed into law in 1980.
- Established the California Department of Aging (CDA) and the Area Agencies on Aging (AAA).
- Expanded to create statefunded programs and services.
- Amended in 2017 to create the Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC).





All Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) Mission

- To provide leadership in addressing issues that relate to older Californians,
- To develop community-based systems of care that provide services which support independence within California's interdependent society, and which protect the quality of life of older persons and persons with functional impairments,
- To promote citizen involvement in the planning and delivery of services.

(Federal) Older Americans Act

- Stipulates that a multi-year, comprehensive Area Plan be developed for each planning and service area.
- (California) Statewide Priorities
 - The State sets statewide **priorities** for providing service to CA's older adults.
- (Riverside County) Development of a 4-Year County-Wide Area Plan
 - AAAs develop the scope of work for local implementation that align with federal and state parameters.



California Master Plan for Aging

Development began June 2019 and was released on January 6, 2021.

- At the time of release, California was one of only five states to release a statewide plan on aging.
- Establishes a blueprint to address system issues and transform services at state, regional, and local levels.
- Aims to create a California for All Ages by 2030 through emphasizing equity and inclusion.
- Lays out five key goals along with strategies to guide public and private organizations.
- Served as one of the major influences in the development of RCOoA's 2024-2028 Area Plan.





Riverside County Office on Aging's Four-Year Service Theme

Aging in Motion

Commitment to proactive outreach and prevention strategies.

"Aging in Motion" is Riverside County's own approach to aging that emphasizes staying active, engaged, and dynamic as one grows older.









49% of surveyed older adults in Riverside County reported a gross household income at or below **\$18,499**.


8% of respondents identified as Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, or Asexual. The national average of LGBA seniors 50+ is reported to be 7%.









2023 Riverside County Health & Wellness

59% of older adults in Riverside County reported having a **chronic health condition**.






67% of older adults report confidence that they can have a positive impact on their own health.





1 in 4 respondents reported receiving food assistance from CalFresh


1 in 5 respondents reported receiving help affording food from food banks, family, or friends.

Volunteering is an important part of many Riverside County seniors' lives.


39% of older adults report participating in volunteer work.






55% of older adults reported they had "excellent" or "good" volunteer opportunities.

Older residents contribute an estimated \$14.8 BILLION annually to Riverside County through paid and unpaid work.




60% of older adults in Riverside County reported having difficulties meeting daily expenses.

2023 Riverside County Caregivers







Caregivers reported that providing care is:

- Physically Difficult 51%
- Emotionally Difficult 41%
- Financially Difficult 41%

25% of respondents felt providing care was difficult in all three aspects.

Caregivers shared their biggest barriers and resources needed.

Barriers to Caregiving:


- Balancing caregiving responsibilities with other responsibilities.
- · Lack of time to care for self.
- Lack of pay/income for providing care.

Resources Needed:

- · Payment for services.
- Education/training on providing care.
- · Time off to care for self.
- Information on caring for others



2023 Riverside County Service Providers



Service Providers gave suggestions on how programs for older and disabled adults can improve:

- Clear Eligibility

Community Surveys: Data collection, Accessible services & integrated care, outreach and networking, and innovation.



OoA Service Data: Meals and Nutrition Education, transportation assistance, inhome care, housing options, case management, financial and utility assistance, home repair/modification, legal and insurance counseling, medical assistance, Grandparents Raising Grandparents Program, caregiver support.

2024-2028 Area Plan Goals

Goal One:

Participate in activities that help build inclusive communities, supporting older and disabled adults to age comfortably and remain in the communities of their choice.

Goal Two:

Provide individuals with resources and programs to encourage mobility, security, self-sufficiency, and social engagement.

Goal Three:

Improve community awareness of public benefits and resources through the use of technology, partnerships, and a person-centered approach.



2024-2028 Area Plan Goals Goal One

Participate in activities that help build inclusive communities, supporting older and disabled adults to age comfortably and remain in the communities of their choice.

Why?

- Sixty percent of respondents to our needs assessment survey experienced not having enough money to meet daily expenses within the past year. The rise of household expenses and the growing prevalence of chronic health conditions along with physical, mental and cognitive impairments means that older and disabled adults require assistance with services that will allow them to remain stable in their homes and communities.
- The Riverside County Office on Aging will expand the reach of its programs by building partnerships with community organizations that support our older and disabled adults' ability to age in place.



2024-2028 Area Plan Goals Goal One

Participate in activities that help build inclusive communities, supporting older and disabled adults to age comfortably and remain in the communities of their choice.

Objectives:

- Expand meal service providers to improve access to under-served and rural areas (e.g., Brown Bag, Congregate, Freezer, Grab-and-Go, and Home Delivered Meals).
- Expand non-traditional partnerships to enhance access and delivery of health and human services programs, and services that cater to the needs of older and disabled individuals (e.g., universities, faith-based organizations, hospitals, etc.).
- Lead key county efforts to develop, modernize, and integrate services for seniors and disabled adults (e.g., homeless, veterans, emergency services, etc.).



2024-2028 Area Plan Goals Goal Two

Provide individuals with resources and programs to encourage mobility, security, self-sufficiency, and social engagement.

Why?

- Forty-two percent of surveyed Riverside County residents experienced feeling lonely or isolated within the past 12 months. This is consistent with national research which has shown that one out of every three adults feels lonely and nearly a quarter of adults aged 65 and older are considered socially isolated.
- The impacts of social isolation and loneliness can have significant health and economic ramifications to individuals and communities. The Riverside County Office on Aging seeks cost effective solutions to increase social connections, reduce isolation, and link clients to information and community resources.



2024-2028 Area Plan Goals Goal Two

Provide individuals with resources and programs to encourage mobility, security, self-sufficiency, and social engagement.

Objectives:

- Reduce social, physical, and medical isolation by promoting one-stop shops and public services and benefits through a No-Wrong-Door approach.
- Promote programs that encourage healthy nutrition, movement, and social engagement amongst older and disabled adults within their communities (e.g., Bingocize, resource centers, access to technology programs, Retired Senior Volunteer Program).
- Promote programs that provide social connectedness, self-care, and supports for caregivers of vulnerable adults. Services include: support groups, training, case management, respite, material aid, outreach, information and assistance, as well as public information and community education on caregiving.



2024-2028 Area Plan Goals Goal Three

Improve community awareness of public benefits and resources through the use of technology, partnerships, and a person-centered approach.

Why?

- Forty-eight percent of surveyed residents described "the availability of information about older adult resources" as being fair or poor with another 26% of respondents having no knowledge of such resources.
- The department is committed to proactive outreach and prevention strategies. Through the county-wide Integrated Service Delivery model, we aim to foster meaningful connections to elevate the service experience of those who have complex needs.



2024-2028 Area Plan Goals Goal Three

Improve community awareness of public benefits and resources through the use of technology, partnerships, and a person-centered approach.

Objectives:

- Participate as a core partner and advocate in community hubs designed to streamline and simplify the delivery of services. Engage at least 100 individuals each month who report an increase in knowledge of older adult services between July 2024 and June 2025.
- Establish *Mobile ADRC* to provide tailored access to programs and supports from any
 location or neighborhood through the use of technology, mobile devices, and resource vans.
 Emphasis on assisting those with great economic and social needs including 911 nonemergency callers, hospital discharges, and individuals with special medical conditions.
- Conduct ongoing needs assessment surveys using varied methods of engagement through department staff and community partners.

Category of Service and the Percentage of **Title III B** Funds to be expended in **FY 2024-2025 through FY 2027-2028**.

Access:

Transportation, Assisted Transportation, Case Management, Information and Assistance, Outreach, Comprehensive Assessment, Health, Mental Health, and Public Information: 25.9%.

In-Home Services:

Personal Care, Homemaker, Chore, Adult Day / Health Care, Alzheimer's, Residential: 6%.

Legal Assistance Required Activities:

Legal Advice, Representation, Assistance to the Ombudsman Program and Involvement in the Private Bar: 3.5%.
