• Call Center update:

Reported the following:

As of November 1st, the Call Center opened back up to provide vaccine booster calls. The Office on Aging is working in conjunction with Riverside County Public Health on this project.

Sent out 126,000 RoboCalls and texts to clients, including Great Plates consumers, SCSEP Participants, Volunteer base, etc., to advise seniors can set up their vaccine booster appointments through the Office on Aging.

Currently receiving approximately 43 calls per day for appointments

Working on a vaccine booster outreach campaign in which 10,000 vaccine booster reminder flyers will be distributed throughout the county.

Also working in conjunction with DPSS, which made 896 appointments, so far.

• Aging and Disability Resource Connection (ADRC):

The ADRC is coalition work in which the Office on Aging collaborates with with other County of Riverside agencies and non-profit organizations to provide No Wrong Door service.

The Council can expect to see ADRC logos in agendas to highlight ADRC work moving forward.

Ota's husband Frank Ota, also 90, sits with his wife during a recent afternoon visit. He knows the cat isn't real. Still, his wife only has eyes for the cat.

"Go to sleep," Taeko Ota croons with each stroke. "Go to sleep."

That calm response is exactly what the Council on Aging-Southern California hoped for when it purchased 200 robotic pets — cats and dogs — to bring comfort to older people at the assisted living homes it serves around Orange County.

The <u>pandemic</u> has been particularly tough for people who live in long-term care. Initially, older people suffered the brunt of COVID-19 fatalities. As other age groups were hit by the pandemic, older people struggled with loneliness and depression because of the isolation that came with strict health-and-safety protocols. Then, a few months ago, the Ombudsman from the Council on Aging stumbled upon the website <u>Joy For All</u> Companion Pets, created by members of a team originally formed under toy manufacturer Hasbro.

ADA: In compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and Government Code Section 54954.2, if special assistance is needed to attend an Advisory Council on Aging meeting, please contact Stacie Catlin at: (877) 932-4100 or TTD 711. Notification of at least 48 hours prior to meeting time will assist staff in assuring that reasonable arrangements can be made to provide accessibility at the meeting.

Public Comments: Each speaker may be limited to speak two (2) minutes or less depending on the number of speakers. At the direction of the Chair or by majority vote of the Council, the two (2) minute time limitation may be waived, increased or reduced. The maximum time for public comment for any individual item or topic may be limited to fifteen (15) minutes. The Council may terminate public comments if such comments become repetitious or disruptive. Any written documents to be distributed or presented to the Council shall be submitted to the Council's assigned staff. This policy applies to Public Comments and general comments on agenda items. Under the Brown Act, the Council will not take action on or discuss matters raised which are not posted 72 hours in advance. Council members may refer such matters to staff for factual information or to be placed on the subsequent agenda for consideration.

RESOLUTION NO. 2021-002

A RESOLUTION OF THE RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING RE-AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE LEGISLATIVE BODIES OF RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING

FOR THE PERIOD NOVEMBER 13, 2021, TO DECEMBER 13, 2021 PURSUANT TO THE RALPH M. BROWN ACT.

WHEREAS, all meetings of RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING and its legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 – 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and view the legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions and requirements; and

WHEREAS, a required condition of Government Code section 54953(e) is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558(b); and

WHEREAS, a further required condition of Government Code section 54953(e) is that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body holds a meeting to determine or has determined by a majority vote that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom issued a Proclamation of a State of Emergency declaring a state of emergency exists in California due to the threat of COVID-19, pursuant to the California

Emergency Services Act (Government Code section 8625); and,

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-07-21, which formally rescinded the Stay-at-Home Order (Executive Order N-33-20), as well as the framework for a gradual, risk-based reopening of the economy (Executive Order N-60-20, issued on May 4, 2020) but did not rescind the proclaimed state of emergency; and,

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom also issued Executive Order N-08-21, which set expiration dates for certain paragraphs of the State of Emergency Proclamation dated March 4, 2020 and other Executive Orders but did not rescind the proclaimed state of emergency; and,

WHEREAS, as of the date of this Resolution, neither the Governor nor the state Legislature have exercised their respective powers pursuant to Government Code section 8629 to lift the state of emergency either by proclamation or by concurrent resolution the state Legislature; and,

WHEREAS, the California Department of Industrial Relations has issued regulations related to COVID-19 Prevention for employees and places of employment. Title 8 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 3205(5)(D) specifically recommends physical (social) distancing as one of the measures to decrease the spread of COVID-19 based on the fact that particles containing the virus can travel more than six feet, especially indoors; and,

WHEREAS, on November 9, 2021, the RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING previously adopted Resolution No. 2021-002, finding that the requisite conditions existed for the RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING and its legislative bodies to conduct remote teleconference meetings without compliance with Government Code section 54953 (b)(3), as authorized by Section 54953(e); and,

WHEREAS, as a condition of extending the use of the teleconferencing provisions for another 30 days beyond the Resolution No. 2021-001 adopted on October 13, 2021, pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(e), the RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING must reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency that exists and find that either the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person or state or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing; and,

WHEREAS, the RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING has reconsidered

the circumstances of the state of emergency and finds that state or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing, based on the California Department of Industrial Relations regulations related to COVID-19 Prevention, specifically, Title 8 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 3205(5)(D), continuing to remain in effect; and,

WHEREAS, as a consequence, the RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING does hereby find that it and its legislative bodies may continue to conduct their meetings by teleconferencing without compliance with Government Code section 54953 (b)(3), pursuant to Section 54953(e), and that such legislative bodies shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed by Government Code section 54953(e)(2).

Section 1. Recitals. All of the above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

Section 2. Reconsideration of the State of Emergency. The RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency that continues to exist and was proclaimed by the Governor through a State of Emergency Proclamation on March 4, 2020.

The RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING hereby proclaims that state officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social (physical) distancing based on the continuance of California Department of Industrial Relations regulations related to COVID-19 Prevention through Title 8 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 3205(5)(D).

Section 4. Remote Teleconference Meetings. The RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING and any of its legislative bodies are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective until the earlier of (i) December 13, 2021, or (ii) such time the RIVERSIDE COUNTY ADVISORY COUNCIL ON AGING adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which its legislative bodies may continue to teleconference without compliance with Section 54953(b)(3). - In 2012-13 the Council on Aging was awarded the contracts to run the HICAP's, Riverside, Inyo and Mono Counties.



Ota's husband Frank Ota, also 90, sits with his wife during a recent afternoon visit. He knows the cat isn't real. Still, his wife only has eyes for the cat.

"Go to sleep," Taeko Ota croons with each stroke. "Go to sleep."

That calm response is exactly what the Council on Aging-Southern California hoped for when it purchased 200 robotic pets — cats and dogs — to bring comfort to older people at the assisted living homes it serves around Orange County.

The <u>pandemic</u> has been particularly tough for people who live in long-term care. Initially, older people suffered the brunt of COVID-19 fatalities. As other age groups were hit by the pandemic, older people struggled with loneliness and depression because of the isolation that came with strict health-and-safety protocols. Then, a few months ago, the Ombudsman from the Council on Aging stumbled upon the website <u>Joy For All Companion Pets</u>, created by members of a team originally formed under toy manufacturer Hasbro.
